span between free play and guided play As described by Fisher et al, free play includes object play, pretend and sociodramatic play, and rough-and-tumble play, in all of which children engage without close adult oversight or control Free play is fun, flexible, active, and voluntary (ie without extrinsic reward)

Nov 20, 1989 · Play-based learning is a pedagogical approach that emphasizes the use of play in promoting multiple areas of children's development and learning Free play and guided play are two types of play-based learning The former is child-directed and internally motivated, while the latter is supported by adults and geared at a specific learning goal
