What's the Big Deal?

Lack of toilet training may -Limit individuals' access to inclusive classrooms -Limit individuals' access to integrated community settings -Limit access to social relationships with peers -Engender negative perceptions and low expectations -Negatively affect individuals' self-concept -Result in dependence on others for support

Perhaps the most well researched method of toilet training for individuals with a developmental disability, including autism, is the Rapid Method of Toilet Training (RTT) 5 This method focuses on giving the child a preferred beverage and then sitting him/her on the toilet at regular intervals until he/she successfully urinates in the toilet

Teaching Functional Skills to Individuals with Autism and ...

The same toilet training procedure is not appropriate for all individuals. Individuals who are severely disabled or older will likely need more intense procedures. Some individuals who have a lot of problem behavior around toileting will need that problem treated first. Sometimes for young children it is appropriate to partially train.

An Evaluation of an Intensive Toilet Training Model

Despite the success of intensive toilet training procedures, there have been concerns over the years about the inclusion of components that may be considered restrictive consequences for individuals with developmental disabilities.
